

Fellow Placement Examples: Uganda



Baylor College of Medicine Children's Foundation, Uganda

Development and Fundraising: Fellow helped secure a \$2 million grant to expand Baylor-Uganda's maternal and newborn health program. The fellow also advocated for the creation of a new resource mobilization department and worked with senior leadership to develop a staffing structure and hiring plan and write job descriptions for the new resource mobilization department.

Clinton Health Access Initiative

eHealth: Fellow developed technological solutions for the government of Uganda and CHAI teams to improve access to health commodities, and improved procurement plans for 244 high-level health facilities.

IntraHealth

Monitoring and Evaluation: Fellow designed and implemented data quality initiatives and provided guidance and education on best practices for data collection, processing, and compilation and reporting, resulting in significant improvement in organizational data quality.

JHPIEGO

Knowledge Management and External Communications: Fellows enhanced organizational brand recognition with allies and partners within the Ministry of Health and other health nonprofits by developing and executing strategies to communicate program information with external and internal audiences.

The Nyaka AIDS Orphans Project

Operations and Program Development: Fellow coordinated a mobile outreach clinic to an underserved area of Kanungu District where the health team saw and treated over 250 patients. Fellow coordinated visiting medical teams that provided dental and chiropractic care to the Nyaka community.

Save the Mothers

Strategic Planning and Development: Developed the first five-year strategic plan and \$500,000 budget for the Mother Baby Friendly Hospital Initiative and contributed to fundraising and grant writing for the organization, which resulted in \$42,000 in increased funding.

Spark Microgrants

Project Coordination: Fellows helped six communities establish sustainable, community-run health centers in Eastern Uganda by hiring and training local health workers and developing partner relationships.

Joint Clinical Research Centre

Research: Fellow carried out baseline assessments of clinical practice quality and assisted in quality improvement initiatives, including those for improving clinical hand hygiene and patient wait-times. They also improved hand hygiene practices by nearly 50% in 3 months.



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Elizabeth Glaser Pediatric AIDS Foundation

Communications: Fellows published over 20 articles, policy papers and technical write-ups for the foundation, including a conference presentation. They also provided health education to numerous community members throughout 13 districts of Uganda.

Other Placement Countries

City of Newark, USA

Policy and Program Evaluation: Fellow served as technical lead on the process evaluation of *Let's Move! Newark*, a city-wide version of Michelle Obama's national initiative aimed at eliminating childhood obesity which involved over 65 partners. The report was presented to the Partnership for Healthier America and National *Let's Move!*

Ministry of Health, Zambia

Research: Fellows coordinated the first national tuberculosis (TB) prevalence survey to assess the number of people suffering from TB. The survey results help accurately distribute health resources and prevent the spread of the disease.

Partners In Health

Partners In Health Rwanda is one of many placement organizations that have benefited year after year from the diversity of ways GHC fellows can contribute to the organization's work.

2015-2016: Fellows innovated a new pharmacy stock management system for Butaro hospital to improve drug storage and distribution. As a result, from Sept 2015 to June 2016 the stock data accuracy improved from 90% and maintained a peak score of 98%.

2014-2015: Fellows facilitated the distribution of \$2.3M of medicine through PIH's supply chain, trained 40+ clinicians on quality improvement, and directed a needs assessment across 11 health facilities evaluating quality of care in the treatment of children with acute malnutrition.

2013-2014: New oncology drugs were added to the Rwandan Ministry of Health's National Essential Medicines list due to the advocacy efforts of fellows.

2012-2013: Fellows provided patient education sessions for more than 200 people on proper use and storage of medicines. The trainings improved treatment adherence, leading to greater health outcomes and more cost-effective use of medicines.

2011-2012: Fellows guided product selection, forecasting and supply planning for the pharmaceuticals annual order (90% of the pharmacy program budget) that resulted into a more efficient allocation of financial resources while ensuring best practices and risk minimization.

2010-2011: Fellows implemented and managed the Mentorship and Enhanced Supervision Program, Infectious Disease (MESH-ID) which improves capacity of health centers by providing increased training for nurses and hiring additional supervisors who focus primarily on mentoring nurses and improving health center care.
